Special Training, Facilities or Equipment Required: Film viewing equipment: Wi-Fi streaming capability, DVD player, Blu-Ray player, computer, sound system, screen.

Course Synopsis: This course has been designed to help students understand and appreciate the role that film plays in the modern world and how it has continuously developed and evolved over time. To expand one's ability to view and appreciate genres that one might not have looked at previously.

Goals and Rationale:

To understand the various genres of film and what their characteristics are.

To be able to think critically about what a film has to say about society and self.

To articulate in various forms (oral, group, writing) what the criticism is about the films viewed.

To be able to develop one's ability to form opinions and find support for those thoughts.

To gain an appreciation for the history of film and its origins.

To be able to see the evolving nature of film through a modern perspective.

Indigenous Worldviews and Perspectives:

Declaration of First People's Principles of Learning: this course recognizes that the development of self is key to connecting with others; learning is embedded in memory, history, and story; learning can be from peers and from mentors and from self; the study of film can demonstrate to the student where he or she fits in society and what his or her identity is; learning within this course can be holistic, reflective, experiential, and relational

Big Ideas - Elaborations

Film appreciation involves the breakdown of film into a variety of genres such as animation, comedy, crime/gangster, drama, film noir, Hollywood musical, sports, sci ft apocalyptic, sci ft fantasy, thriller/horror, war, and western.

Film appreciation involves the viewing of films that have been critically acclaimed, award-winning or nominated, and/or ground-breaking. Film appreciation involves the viewing of films within each genre over time, from the earliest endeavors to the latest.

Curricular Competencies - Elaborations

Use inquiry processes and skills to ask questions; gather, interpret, and analyze data; and communicate findings and decisions:

The students chose a genre to study such as drama to have them think critically about the genre.

the students will discuss the elements of films using aspects such as camera techniques, acting, writing, plot devices, endings, special effects, color, and music

the students will view a series of award-winning drama films over the years such as 'Citizen Kane' (1941), 'Shawshank Redemption' (1994), and 'Spotlight' (2015)

the students will elaborate on the evolving techniques used throughout the years as demonstrated within the film examples the students will read professional criticisms of the early films

The students will write their own criticism of the latest film viewed to demonstrate creative AND critical thinking.

Content - Elaborations

Due to the typical unit in film, the student will know the following:

each will know what characteristics make up a particular genre

each will have an understanding through use of support and detail for any characteristic

each will gain a new understanding of the techniques of whole film and what it can mean to each

each will be able to find a deeper appreciation of where each fit into society

Due to the final project in this class, the student will know the following:

each student will have a clear understanding of all elements behind film shown in a meaningful project of his or her own choosing each student will show appreciation of other projects through the collaborative viewing and discussion of what all students have done
