## What is LFI?

Late French Immersion is a 2-year, accelerated language program offered at Beirsto Elementary School. It is an opportunity for students to enter the Immersion program in Grade 6. Students and their families do NOT need to know any French to enroll in the program.

Students learn the French language and regular curriculum at the same time. Through the immersion process, students become more fluent in French and gain a deeper understanding of French culture. Upon completion of Grade 7, students are fully prepared to join the regular French Immersion program in Grades 8 at W.L. Seaton Secondary.
